



# CLAN MACRAE MONUMENT

The tall granite Clan MacRae War Memorial was constructed above the ruined church and churchyard at Clachan Duich in Kintail, the church is an ancient burial site of the MacRaes of Kintail. It shows a kilted Highland soldier, with his head bowed, stepping out of a carved granite block. When the memorial was unveiled Colonel John McCrae did a recitation of his famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

The memorial came about when it was decided to commemorate the MacRae members who fell during World War One. It is thought that the same craftsmen who were working on the

restoration of Eilean Donan at the time did the carving. They would have been subcontracted to Messrs R. Gray and Co who were the sculptors. It was unveiled on the 15th July, 1922.

The inscription reads – "ERECTED BY THE CLAN MACRAE AND FRIENDS IN MEMORY OF THE MACRAES AND RELATIVES AT HOME AND ABROAD WHO FELL IN THE GREAT WAR, 1914-1918." "GUS AM BRIS AN LA" - Gaelic for 'Until The Day Breaks.'

A number of MacRaes were in attendance these being Sir Colin G. Macrae; Mr. Peter Macrae, Hon. Secretary; Thomas McCrae, Canada; Dr. F. Macrae, Edenbane and Mr. John C. Macrae, President of the committee who organised the statue memorial.


The figure of the soldier is on a pedestal with a rough hewn stone slab behind him. The whole lot is on a stone base. The inscriptions are in raised lettering on the front of the plinth. The Clan Macrae badge is carved in relief at the top of the pedestal. The Memorial was enclosed by a wrought iron railing fence when built.

## FLODDEN 1513

King James IV of Scotland had ideas of taking over England. As England's King Henry was away conducting his invasion into France, it appeared to be the ideal time to make a move. His Scottish Army was all prepared and armed with pikes, axes and cannons.

Some 50,000 troops of King James IV crossed the border into Northumberland in August 1513. Initially his men gained some ground including the small castles at Werk and Norham. The Earl of Surrey, Thomas Howard, took the initiative and had an army of around 20,000 march north to meet the confident Scottish troops. The Earl found King James at Flodden near Branxton in Northumberland.

Ironically, James IV allowed the English troops to cross over the narrow Twizel Bridge unimpeded and form up in readiness for the battle. The Scottish King had his troops drawn up on salient ground which was bordered by the River Till. He had a good view of the situation.



The Earl of Surrey ignored the Scottish guns trained on the bridge and proceeded to form up his soldiers into two large divisions ready for the fight. During the afternoon the Scottish troops commenced the battle. It was on 9th September, 1513, and conditions were quite wet and slippery. The English fired off a volley of guns to their advantage when the Scottish gunners realised that they couldn't depress their cannon muzzles low enough, thus effecting their accuracy. The English also had cavalry troops.

The English troops had more accurate artillery as well as archers who proved to be every precise. Before long the Scottish soldiers began to be ripped apart.

Frustrated as to how the battle was going, the Scottish forces broke ranks and charged down from the high ground. The highlanders couldn't maintain



Hill via their left flank trapping a large number of King James's reserve. This manoeuvre saw a section of the Scottish troops trapped who soon got involved in fierce hand-to-hand combat.

The 'Blue blanket', the Scottish flag adorned with thistle and imperial crown was shredded. Edinburg tradesmen fought on Flodden Field on the 9th September, 1513, with very few returning. Right – this picture shows Ralph Murray carrying the remains of their flag.

their formation though they still managed to inflict injuries to the English.

Wounded soldiers began to leave the battlefield if they could, some making their way to Edinburg. King James led a number of the charges. Then the English charged up the Branxton



Around 10,000 Scottish troops lost their lives in the battle as they descended down Branxton Hill. The Scottish King also lost his life and his forces were defeated by England's King Henry VIII.

THE SCOTS HAD THEIR OWN GUILLOTINE

In the mid 1500s, long before the French Revolution, a Scotsman had developed a beheading machine. It was in use from 1564 – 1710 and was called the 'Maiden.' The framework was constructed of locally sourced oak timber with a sharpened iron blade. The mechanism comprised of a lead weight to make sure the head was completely cut off and a rope to pull the blade up to the top ready for the release. Beheading machines, similar to this Scottish one, were in use throughout Europe.

It was later quite ironic that the man who suggested the idea of Scotland having a beheading contraption ended up having his own head cut off by the Maiden on 2nd June, 1581.

The unit, which was used in the High Cross off the High Street in Edinburgh in Scotland, was some 13 feet in height and was quite portable thus allowing it



to be relocated to another town or area if he The local magistrates need considered the guillotine as a humane device. The Maiden is known to have been used in Castlehill Grassmarket. It was used for almost 150 years in which time some 150 people were executed, about on a year. Prior to its introduction the sword was used in the beheading spectacles in Scotland.

Condemned prisoners would be brought by soldiers from all districts of Scotland public into Edinburgh for their execution. The Scottish Justiciary Court, their criminal court, could condemn people for robbery, treason, adultery,

murder, forgery, incest, robbery and other misdemeanours.


The instrument was used for the affluent classes as well as the workers and peasants. One such case was James Douglas, the 4th Earl of Morton, who was one of the regents of Scotland, and who governed Scotland while James VI was an infant. The Earl had the job from 1572 to 1578. James was incriminated in the murder of Mary, Queen of Scots' second husband, Lord Darnley, with the Scottish Justiciary ordering his execution.

# SCOTTISH CONCERTS POPULAR

A Scottish concert was given on Wednesday 14th March, 1888, in the School of Arts Hall in connection with the Bathurst Branch of the Highland Society of New South Wales. The attendance was limited as to numbers. The program consisted wholly of Scottish music and had been arranged for the purpose of giving the pupils the opportunity of hearing Mr. David McAndrew, whose reputation as the vocalist was pretty well known. His considerable ability was appreciated as he rendered his act, which was thoroughly humorous in all his renderings. He sang "Battle of Shirramuir", "March of the Cameron Men", "Jennie's Bawbee", "The Laird of Cockpen", "Auld Tam Trew", "Umph", "Larry O'Toole" and "Baudie Buchanan". Mrs. Innes also sang.

Later in the year there was a very well attended adult concert put on by the Caledonian Society in the same venue. Mr. McGregor, with his melodious tone, gave pleasing renditions of Schubert's "Ave Maria." During the evening the Highland fling was danced by a group of four young ladies resplendent in their kilted dress. The audience's response to the display saw the dance repeated. Mr. McGregor, Messrs G.B. McRae and D. McAndrew with Mrs. Rae as the accompaniment saw a beautiful result.

Some of the songs in the concert were – "Annie Laurie", "I'm Owèr Young to Marry Yet", "I'll Come Tae Ye Ma Lad", "For You Alone", "Comin' Through-the Rye", "Angus McDonald", "Song of Long Ago", "The Bonnie Bank of Loch Lomond", "Bonnie Mary of Argyle" and "Scotland Yet".



Above - The School of Arts in Bathurst, which was constructed in stages, had its progress and activities regularly recorded in the local Bathurst newspapers of the day. Land for a building, such as for a School of Arts, was selected as early as 1844 but it seems the first location didn't please the committee and land on the corner of Howick and William Streets was sought and later gazetted.

The building got underway on 12th June, 1855, with Dr. Busby becoming President. Imagine how proud Dr. Busby was at the Annual General Meeting in February, 1862, to report to the gathering that the Bathurst School of Arts now had their own building, this being for their permanent library of purchased and donated books.
